It is fair to say that January Birdwatch events have raised learners' interest and curiosity to not only observe and count bird species but also to learn about their traits, feeding and nesting habits.




World Book Day





Celebrating 40 years of Comic Relief






Pupils from Ashington enjoyed celebrating 40 years of comic relief . learners participated in a four mile walk to Newbiggin by the sea.

Careers





Throughout the Spring term,
Parkside House School have
facilitated a robust careers
curriculum. Each teaching group
has a bespoke Careers programme,
tailored to their ability and/or year
group, whichever is most
appropriate. The content delivered
to the young people is a mix of
OFG's Incredible Futures Careers
Curriculum and one created by
Buzz's Careers Lead.

Lessons this term include Jobs in the Community, Applications, CV and Cover Letters, Independent Living, Finances and Tax (for Global Money Week) Careers Week and National Apprenticeship Week.

Young people also took part in practical activities such as a visit to AkzoNobel where all school learners had a tour of the facility and were introduced to the different departments and job roles within the most sustainable paint factory in the world, right here in Ashington. Alongside weekly employability and careers lessons in the Spring term, all young people from Year 10 to Year 14 have been given a careers interview by our Careers Advisor, Michala Mason, Northumberland County Council Career Advisor, Michael Holliday or Buzz College Employability and Careers Lead, Hannah Harighi. These interviews, along with physical visits to other post-16 provisions have helped inform college learners, their parents and Local Authority as to what will be the learner's preferred destination in September 2025. In February, Claire Angus from the DWP visited the school to deliver a session on Interview Techniques.




We are thrilled to announce we have been awarded the Wellbeing Award for Schools (WAS).


