Definitely a day to remember!



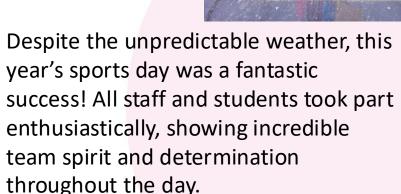








### Sports Day @ Backworth

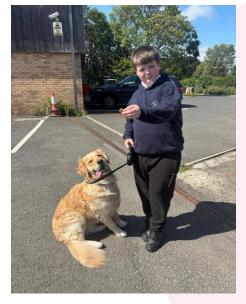
